
Where does it lead?




In pursuit of excellence


designs. Other projects included basketweaving, jewelry making, and making a stained glass window, an annual project; this year it was for Mr. Palmer's room.

Lisa Key works on one of the stained glass projects in Young Artists.


The talk of the Argylls







Focus on communications skills


Our English language is one of the most important elements of learning. Communication skills provide the necessary basis of all further knowledge. The following curriculum is followed in the Language Arts Department to assure that M-G graduates have adequate communication skills. Starting with the Class of 1989, four years of English are required to graduate. A large amount of time is spent learning grammar, studying different genres of literature, and perfecting composition skills by writing themes. By the end of their senior year, students have written nearly 50 themes to better prepare them for college.

The publications class is one of the special-





Time is also devoted to learning the life skills which will allow him/her to become responsible employees, consumers, and citizens.

Learning disabled students spend 1 or 2 periods each day with Miss Henricks or Mrs. Shock. Some are instructed in academic courses; however, most are provided with supplementary assistance. This may be in the form of aid in completing daily assignments, extended test time, or oral testing.








Losing streak ends, Curse is broken




Argylls set school record


The Argylls finished third in the Central Indiana Conference with a 5-2 record, behind CIC Champions Tipton and Conference runner-up Alexandria.

































Hole in one!








