
















The Class of 1983



Joanie Butcher was the recipient of the DAR award. This award is given to the per-


son the Daughters of the American Revolution think is most deserving of the "good citizen" title.

A day of excitement in


Washington D.C.













Science Classes Learn By Experimenting


The science classes this year went on their annual field trip to Chicago. Included in the trip were the Science & Industry building, the Field Museum and other interesting sites of Chicago.

The library, formerly thought of as just a place to check out books, but can be a place to go to look up research material, to study, and sometimes just to waste time. All the time students go there for many different reasons.










Several methods of raising money were used this year to support the many clubs and organizations at M-G.



Overall Clubs and Organizations provides a social atmosphere for all students.






The girls' tennis team had a very productive year sending their number one doubles team of Jackie Kelich and Linnie Stookey to the regional. They compiled a great






There comes that time in each school year when strange things begin to occur. Students begin to crack under the pressures of homework, and the teachers begin to lose control of their own minds, as well as their students'.
