









Highlighting the political events of the year was the resignation of former President Richard Nixon. Nixon announced his resignation on August 9, 1974, as a result of the Watergate Scandal and of rumors of an impending impeachment.

Following Nixon's resignation, Gerald Ford, the Vice-President who had recently replaced Spiro T. Agnew, was sworn in as President on August 10. As a result a vacancy in the Vice-Presidency was created and Nelson Rockefeller was nominated by President Ford.

Economy and honesty were featured topics in the off-year election campaigns. The Bayh-Lugar contest for the U.S. Senate seat was the most widely publicized of the races held in Indiana. In a close and heated race Senator Bayh was re-elected. Elections became more important and relevant as more students became eligible to vote.


Inflation has become an ordinary topic of conversation as the cost of living reached a new high. The rising cost particularly affected the price of sugar which in turn caused other food prices to increase. Even school lunches at M-G became examples of these as the price was again increased.


Unemployment also reached a high as many lay-offs and shut-downs became prevalent, especially in the automobile industry. Effects of these shut-downs were felt by the families of the M-G students as they involved many nearby factories and plants.

A dispute between striking coal miners and mine operators threatened the availability of energy for the nation and the production of steel which in turn affected the automobile industry.







The close of the evening proved to be rather disappointing though, with the loss of the game to Wes-Del and the absence of the annual Homecoming Dance.



Other than the experiences that they acquired during their eight day stay, they each received one hour semester credit to any college of their choice for completing the session of Girls' and Boys' State.









A yule log and tacos headed the food list at the annual French and Spanish Christmas party. Customs, songs, and games from both countries were used for entertainment.





The annual spring trip to Chicago was open to anyone taking a science course with the exception of biology student.



Mathematics courses prepared students for situations where math would be used.






"To enjoy music and perform," is, in a few words, the objective of the choral department.


Diaster day highlights health classes

Physical education strives to promote the physical growth while contributing to the general health and well-being. New to the physical education program this year were units of tennis and golf for both boys and girls.






Students gain experience for future careers

A specific area of physical education such as gymnastics, volleyball, or golf is taught by P.E. assistants. Each assistant takes over the challenge of teaching an area to the other students.


Each of Mrs. Shoptaw's librarians made a bulletin board sometime during the year as a portion of their grade.


"To allow a student to experience a teaching situation prior to university training," is the main objective of exploratory teaching according to Mr. Kirkpatrick.

Student expression, self-confidence come from art work


"To develop a personal expression through a student's art work and to help students develop self-confidence, and become better-adjusted citizens," were the goals for Mrs. McConnell's art students.

Ceramics was offered as an adult education course. For thirteen weeks adults met on a once a week basis to learn the basic fundamentals of ceramics.




NHS uses new tapping method





Drama Club presents Harvey


FFA attends national convention in Kansas City




“Make Your Own Kind of Music”







They have planned new activities for this school year. The group held its own Fall Swing Choir Workshop with five other schools. They participated in the variety show as well as performed throughout the community.


The director of the group is Mrs. Beth Walton. She selected the group last spring on the basis of facial expression, attitude, blending ability, and their ability to do choreography.










the Argylls beat thirty-eight out of the forty-nine teams that they ran against.





The girls' volleyball team, with only three returning lettermen from last year's sectional champs, still had a winning record and finished runner-up to Oak Hill in the Sectional.



Charlotte Denny coached the 1974 team to an 8-3 record. The B-team finished with a fine 9-1 record.



The 1974-75 gymnastics team completed with much success. Coach Denney had a corp of very talented and experienced girls. Coach Denney had eight letter winners returning to compete.



Argylls enter tough C.I.C.


The combination of the new competitive CIC conference and the smallest Argyll team ever to play made the 1974-75 season a disappointing but exciting one.







Twenty-five students participated in intramural bowling. League games, consisting of seven teams were held every Wednesday evening after school.


Mr. Bach sponsored the program and presented trophies to the league champs, individual highscorer, and most improved bowler.



Gary Hodupp, Brian Smallwood and Doug Pettit each won County Titles for the Argylls. The team finished third.





Senior Rob Ricks led the team in hitting with a .381 batting average.





Returning lettermen for next year are Kevin Cook, Gary Jackson, Ken Kurtz, Dave Hiatt, Terry Spahr and





Faculty members benefit students

The sophomores are also looking forward to becoming juniors and getting that extra responsibility.




