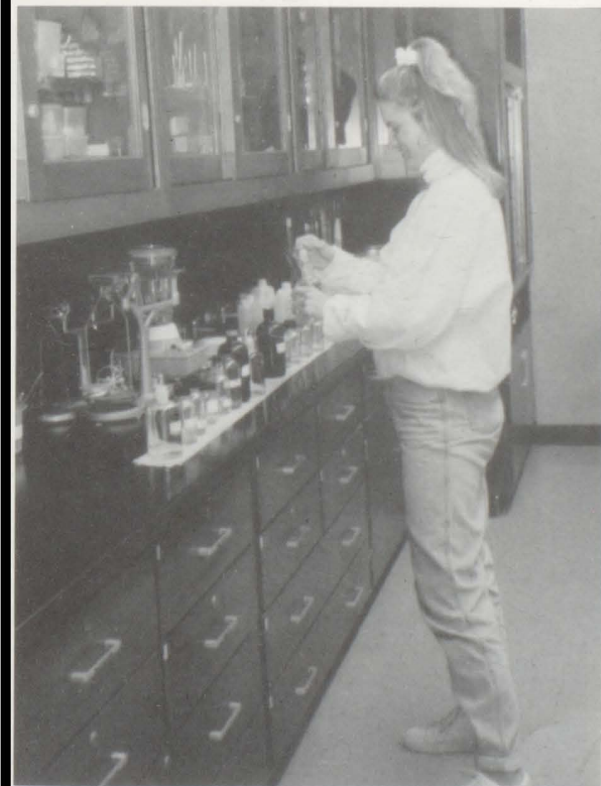
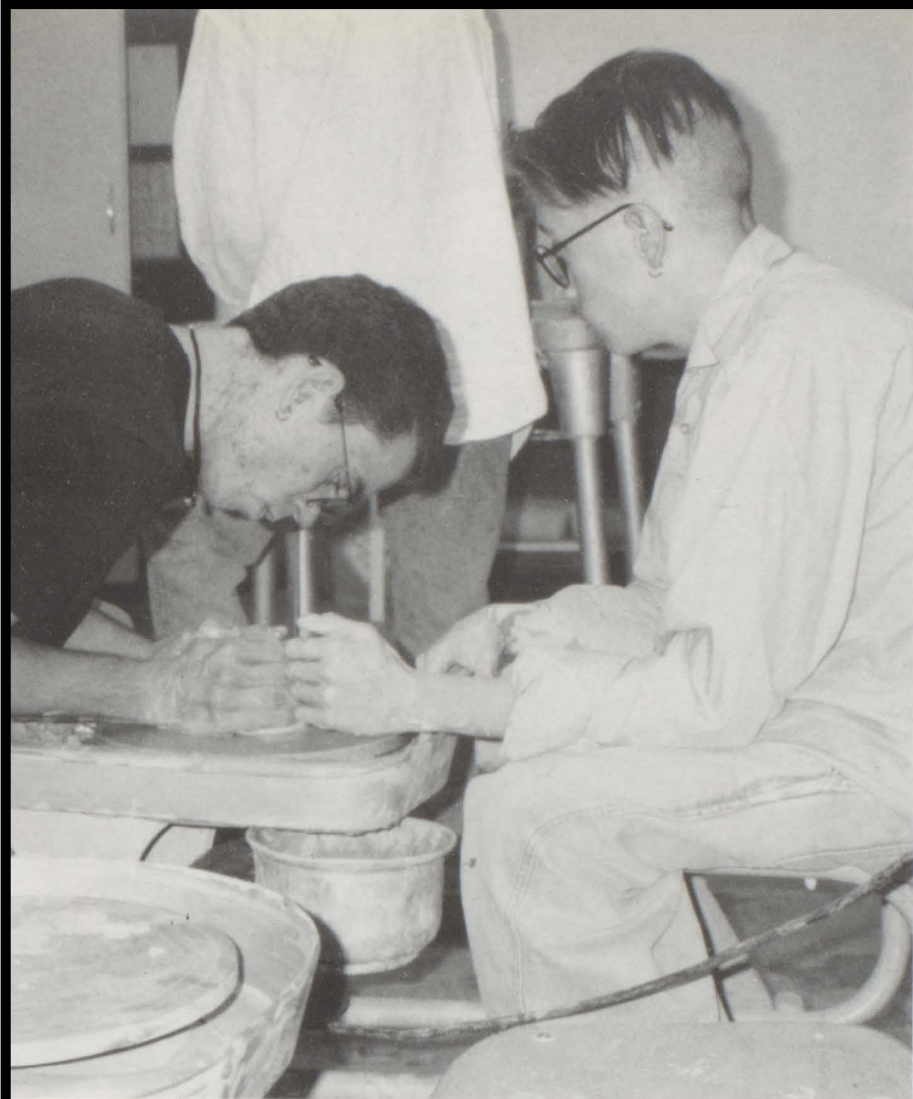
FELLOWSHIP OF THE APPRENTICES

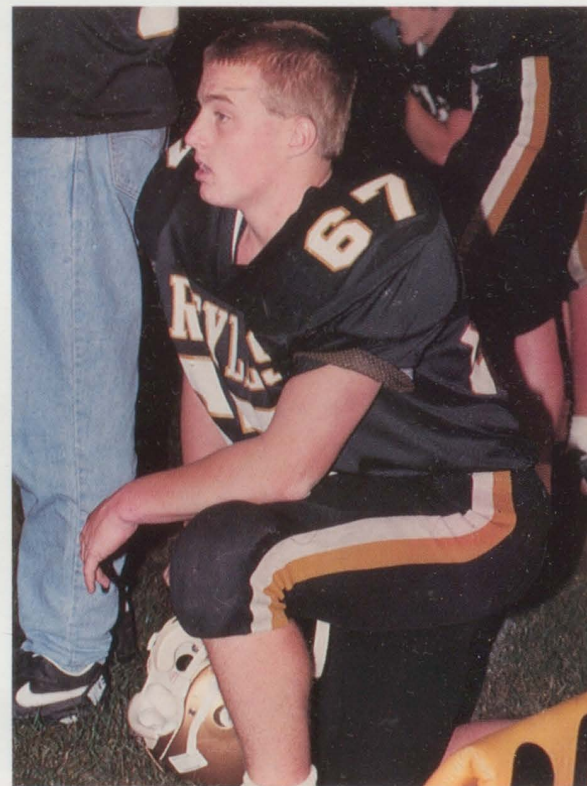

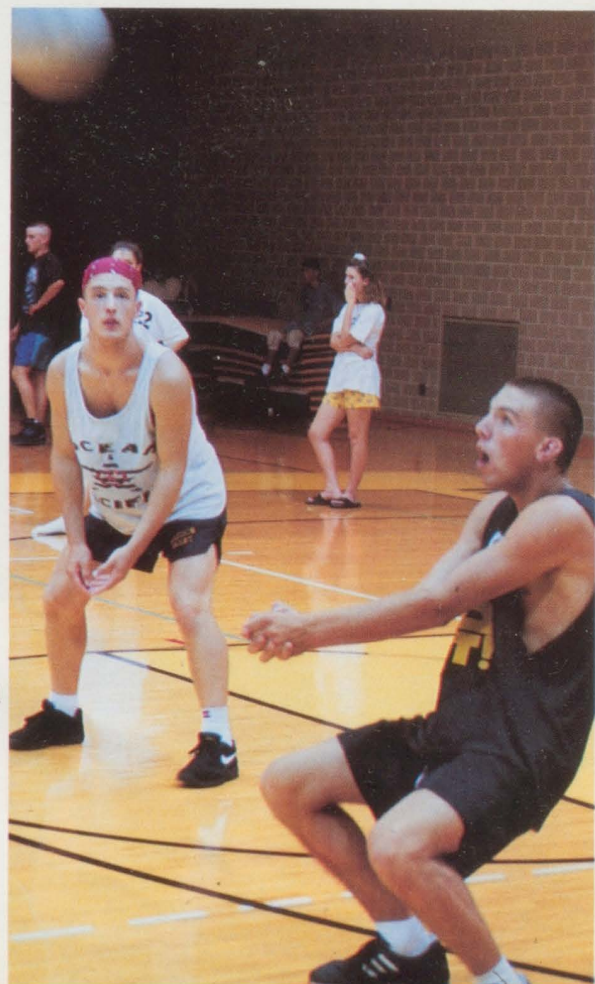
The competition was tough all week, especially between the two upper classes. Everyone was vying for the top spot, and yet all still remained proudly on the same side, the black and gold.

All's well that ends well, they say. The Argylls had beaten Blackford, and the juniors and seniors had ranked supreme.



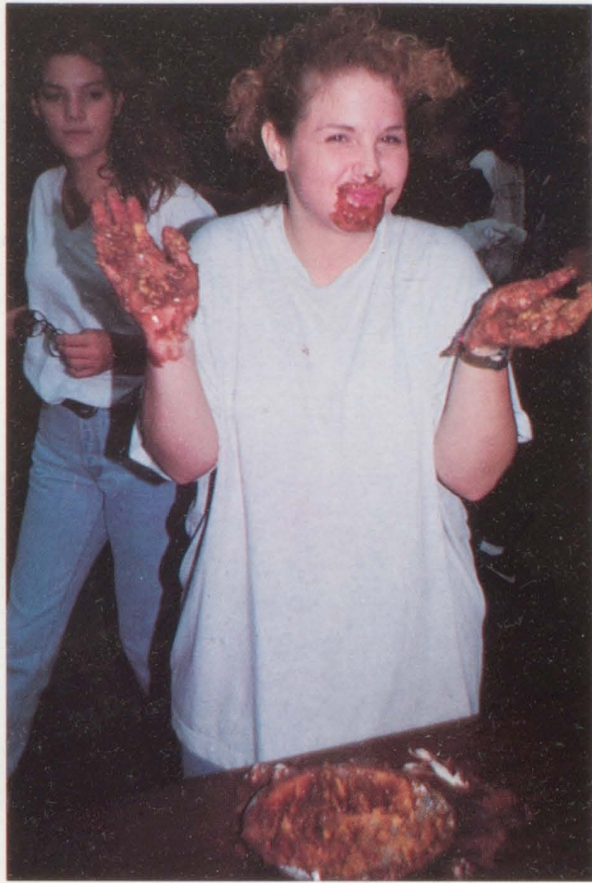

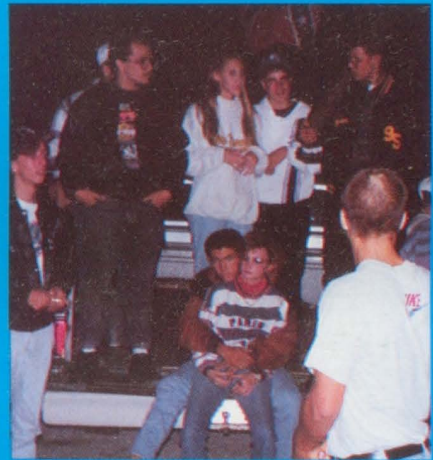

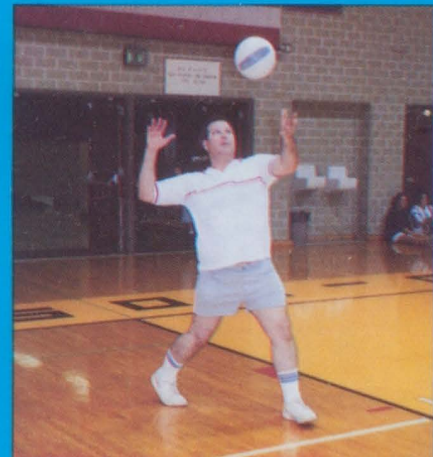

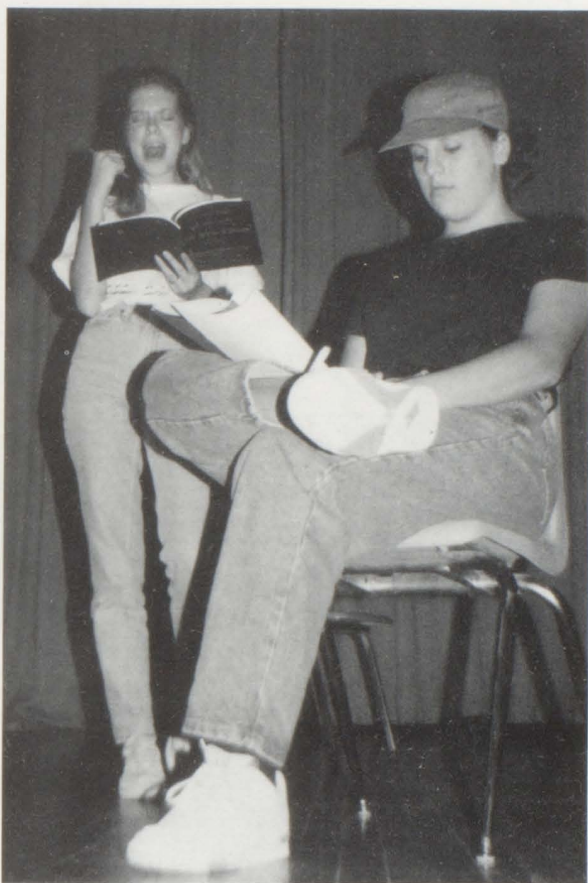

Renaissance Within

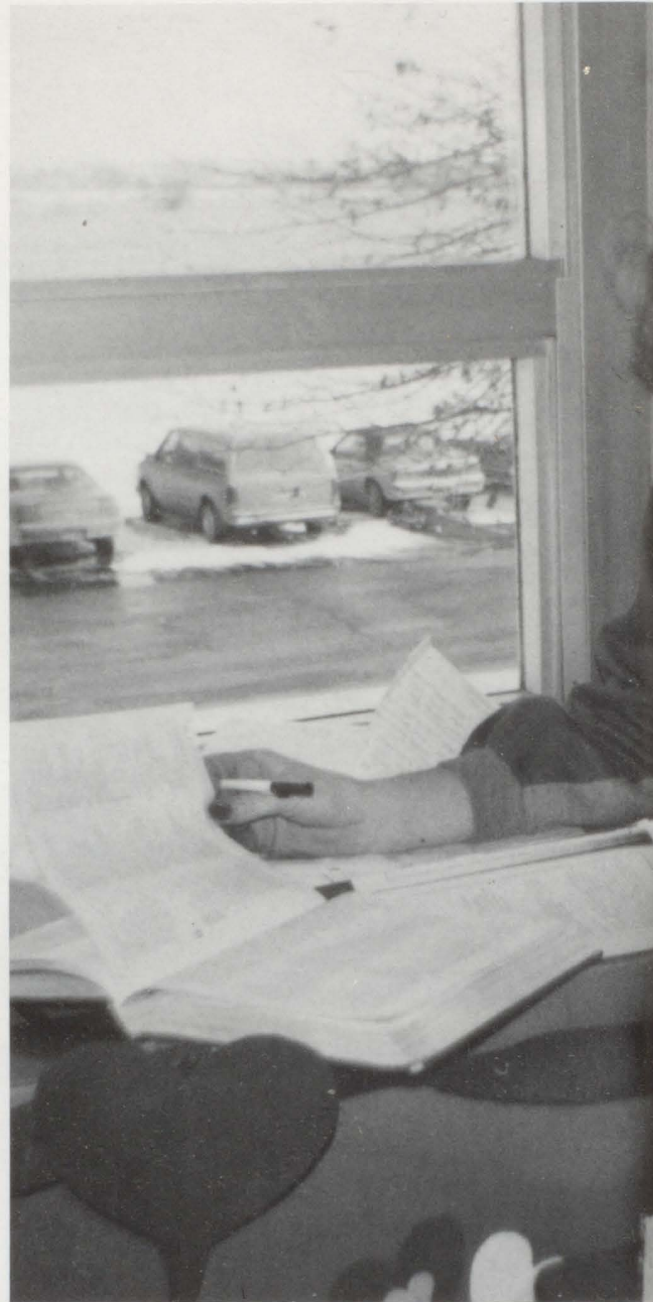
As each year changes, the class curriculum broadens as well.

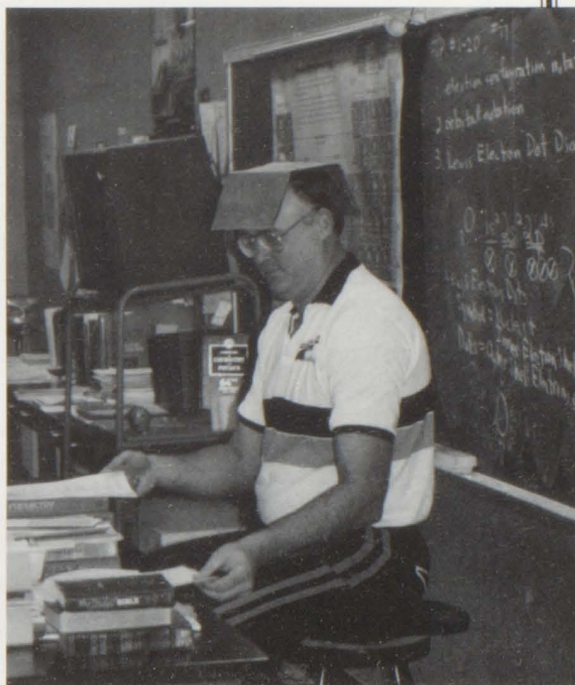

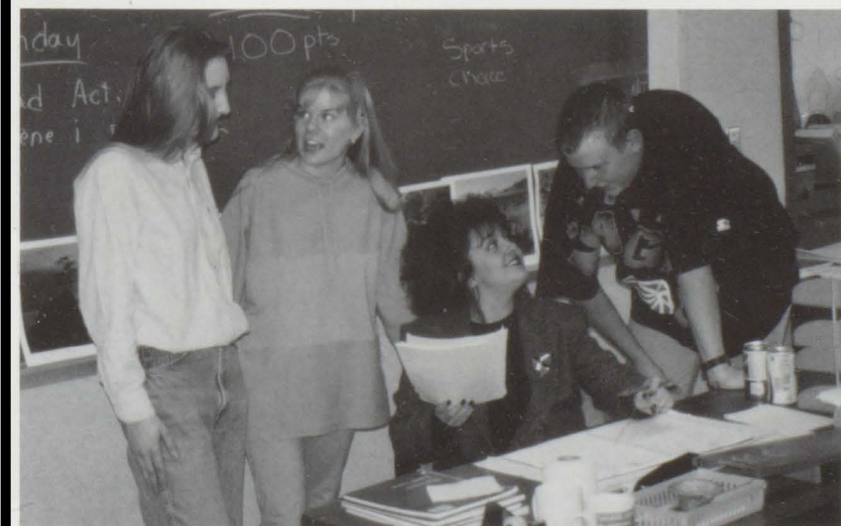

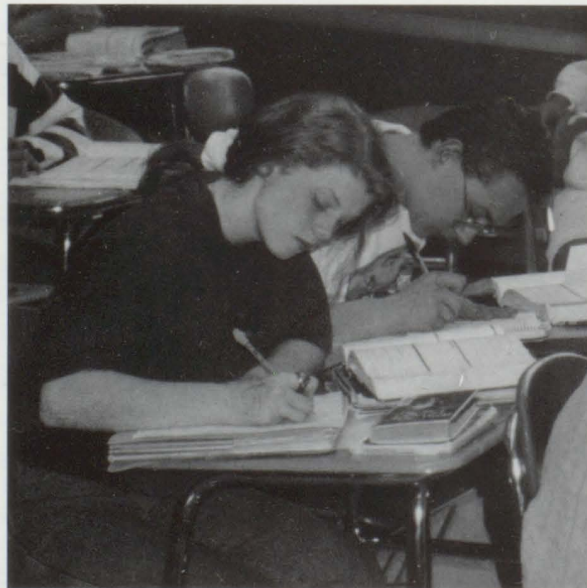

The Math Department got a new computer lab made up mostly of older computers, but the lab still proved useful to both students and faculty.



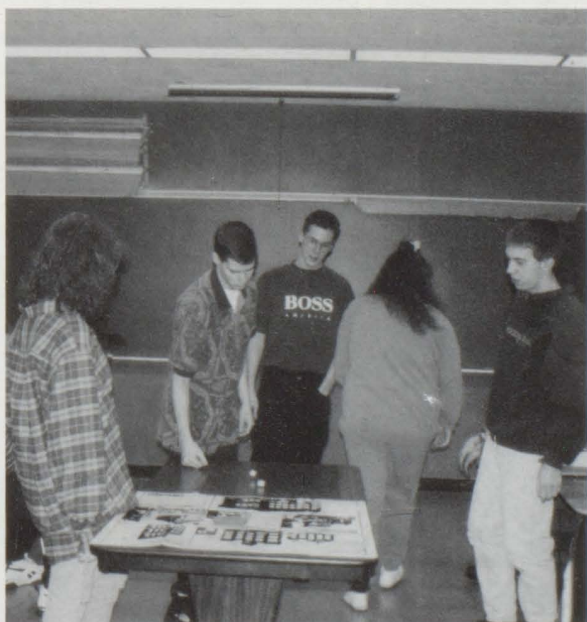

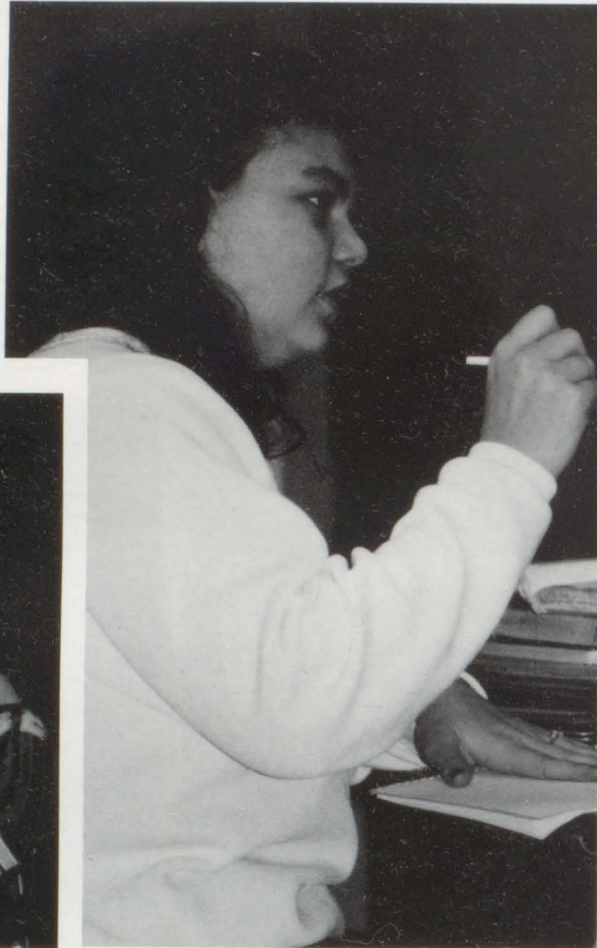

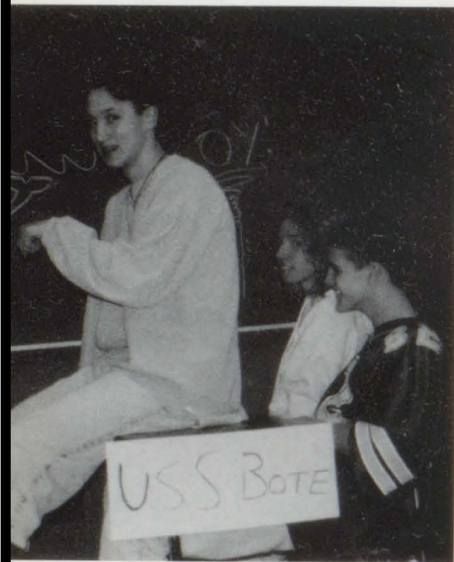

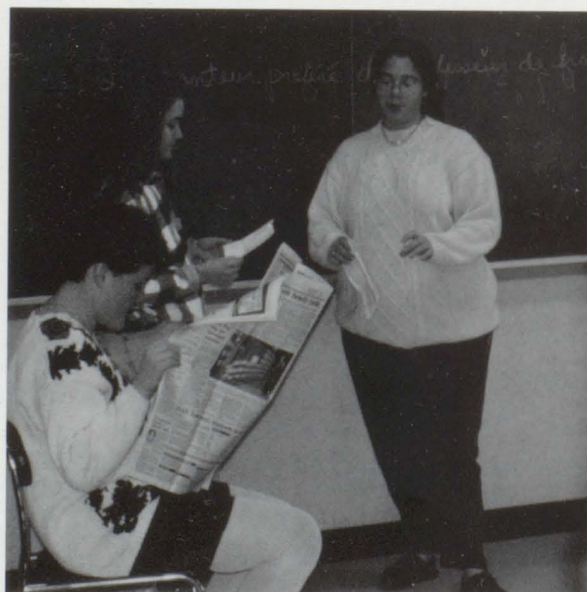

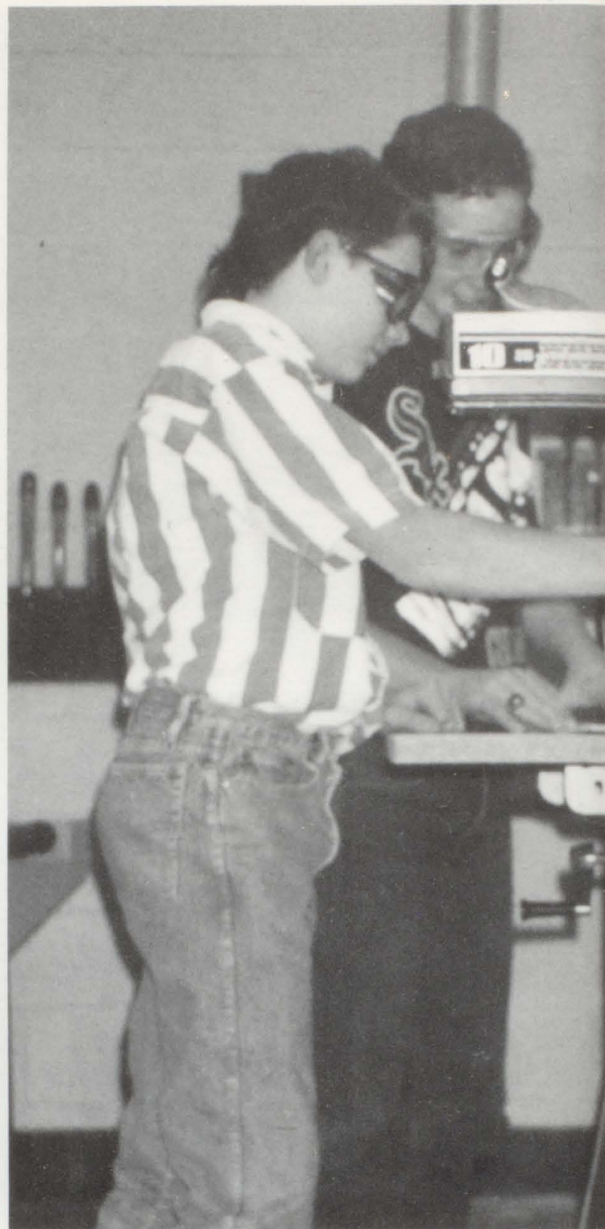

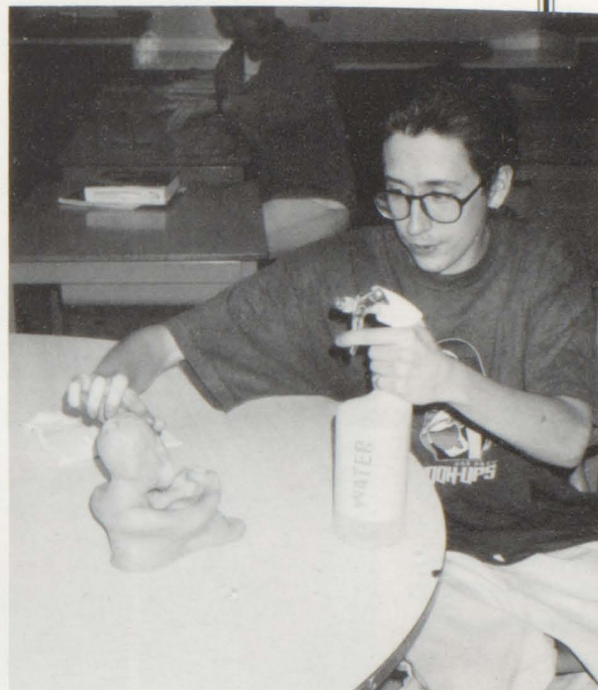

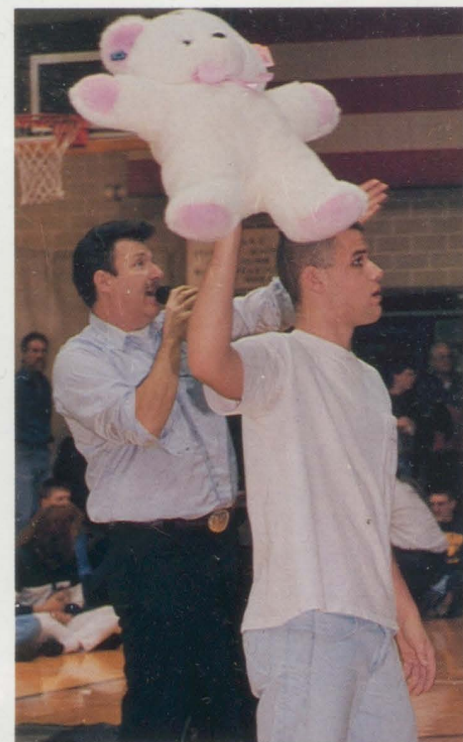

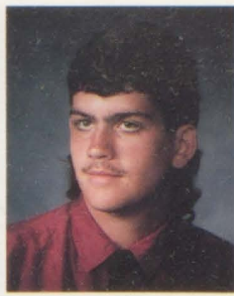

Also included in their list of attractions was a nuclear energy museum, a meteor site, and a ski resort near one of the colleges.

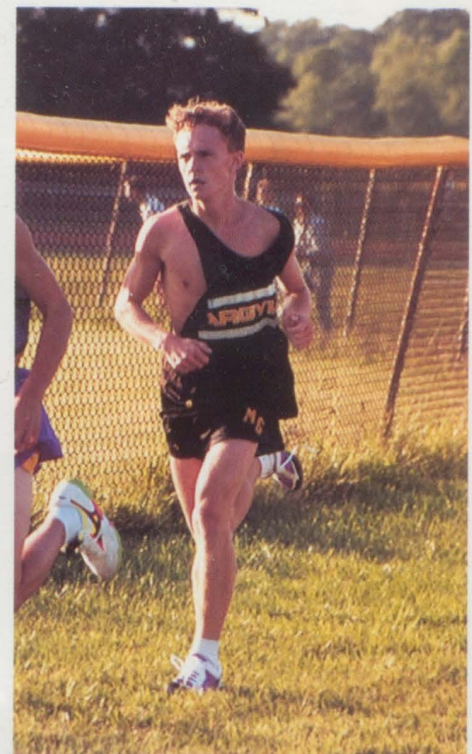

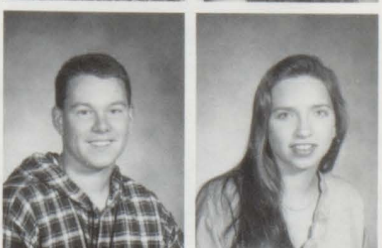
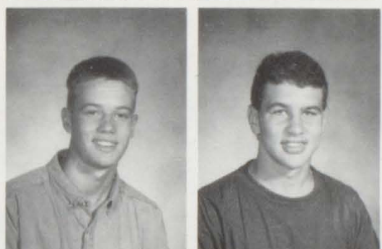

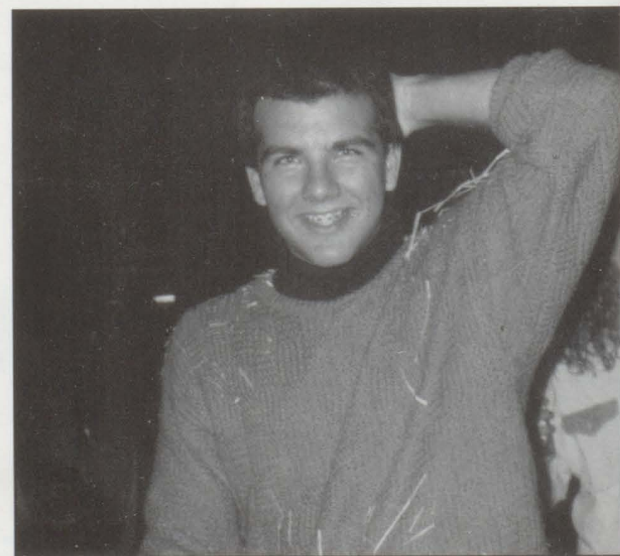


No Pain, No Gain

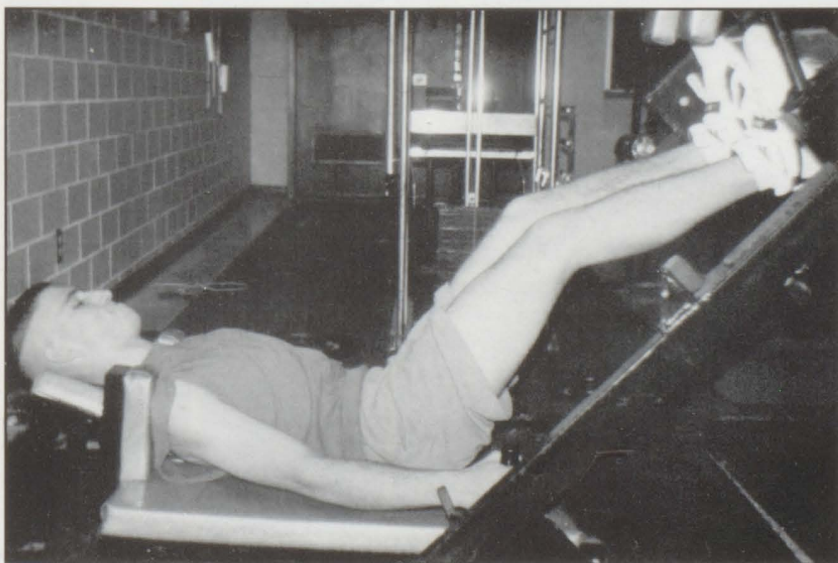

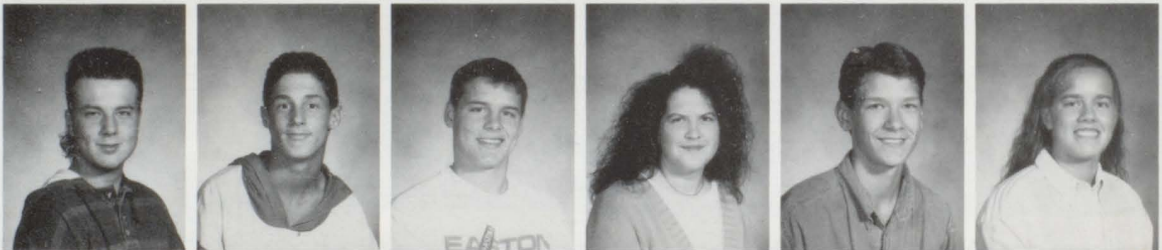

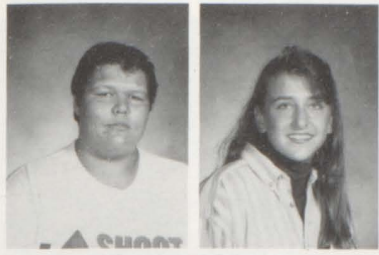

Tomorrow, most are unsure of, so we must abide together in this present age of only our understanding.

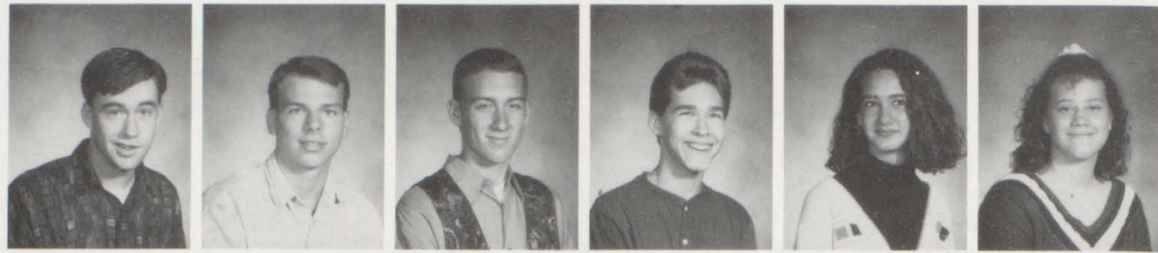

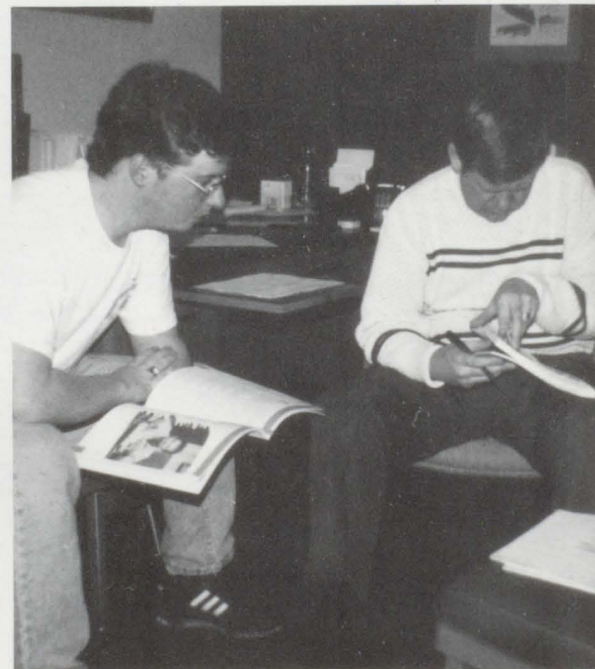

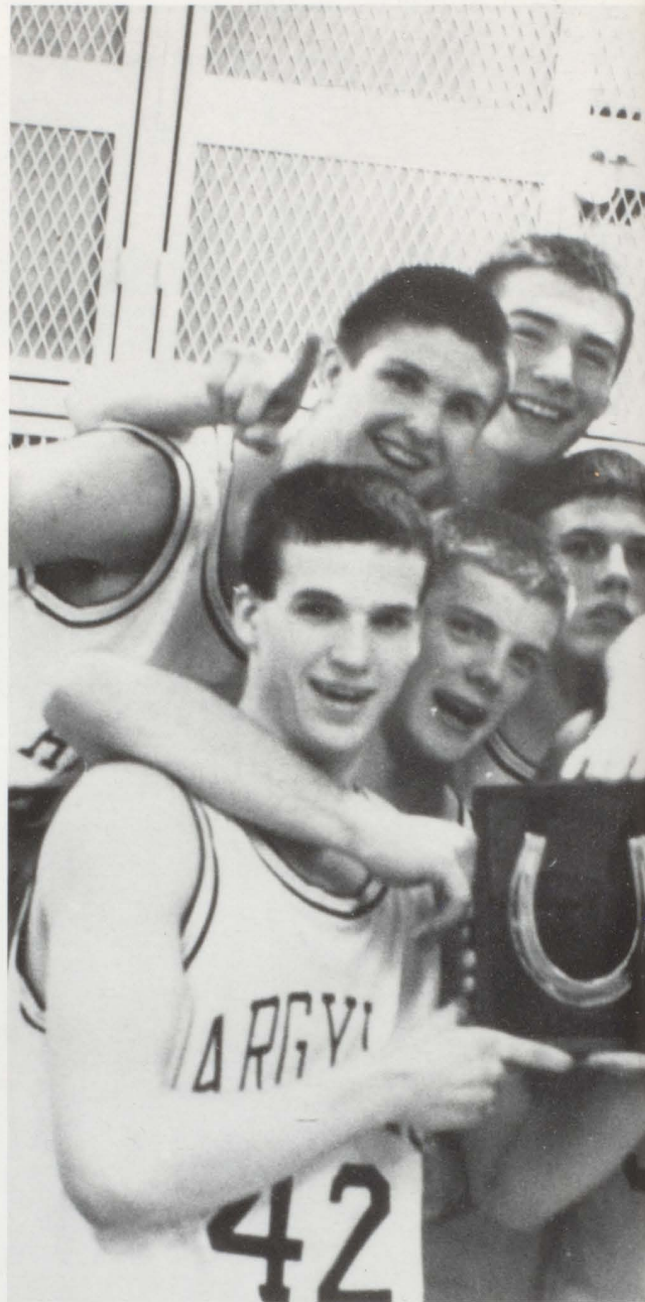
A Call to Arms

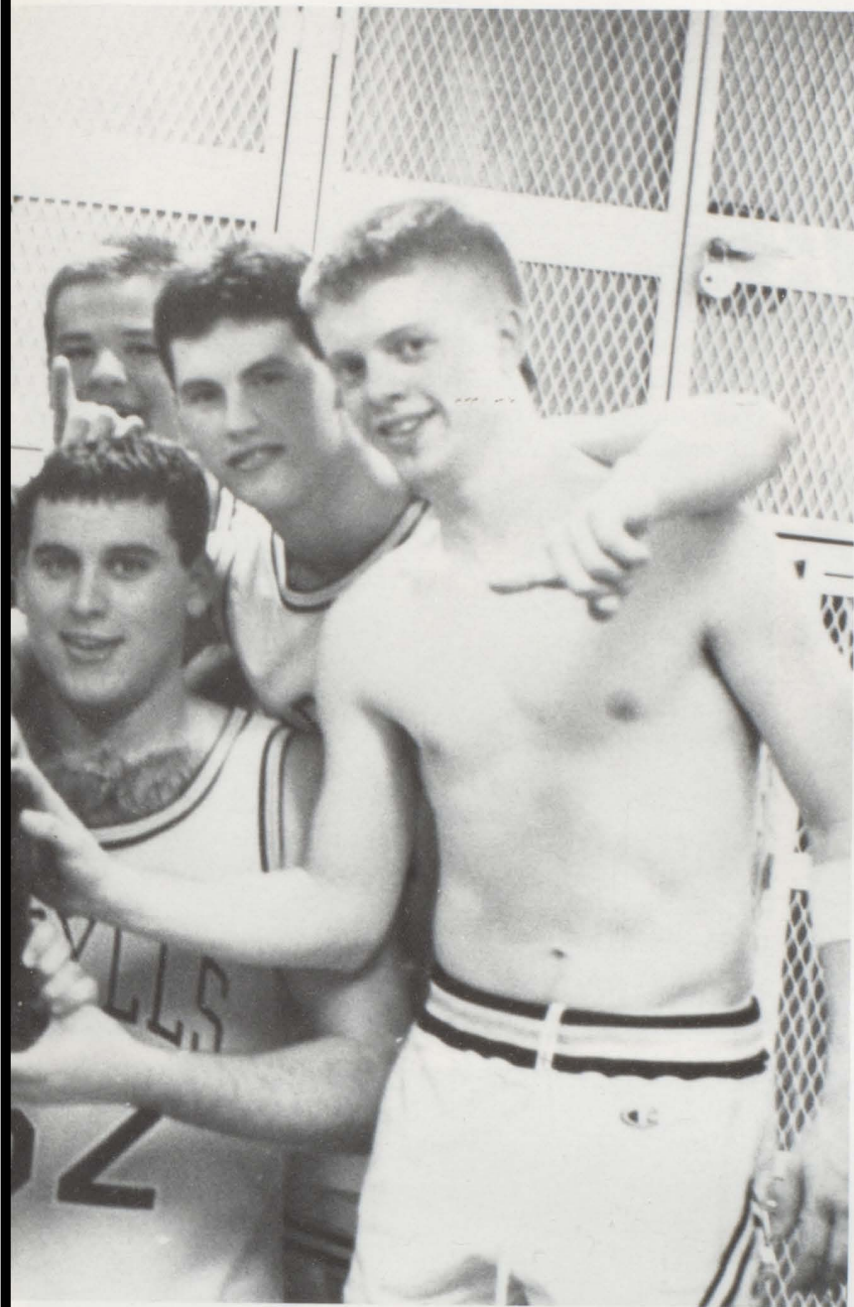

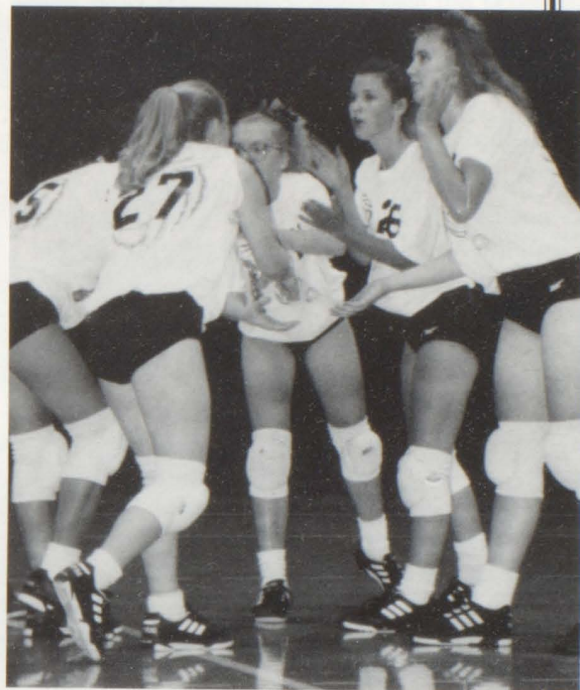

This year the varsity cheerleaders planned to compete at King's Island's annual cheerleading competition. Just weeks before the competition, Tracy Pearson

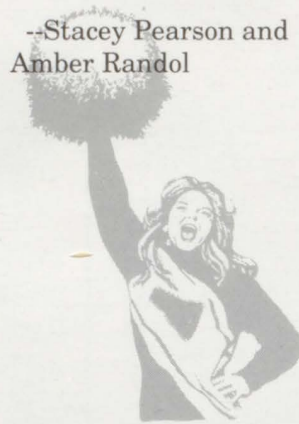
broke her ankle. The freshman cheerleaders then joined varsity, and though they did not place, they competed as one unified squad.

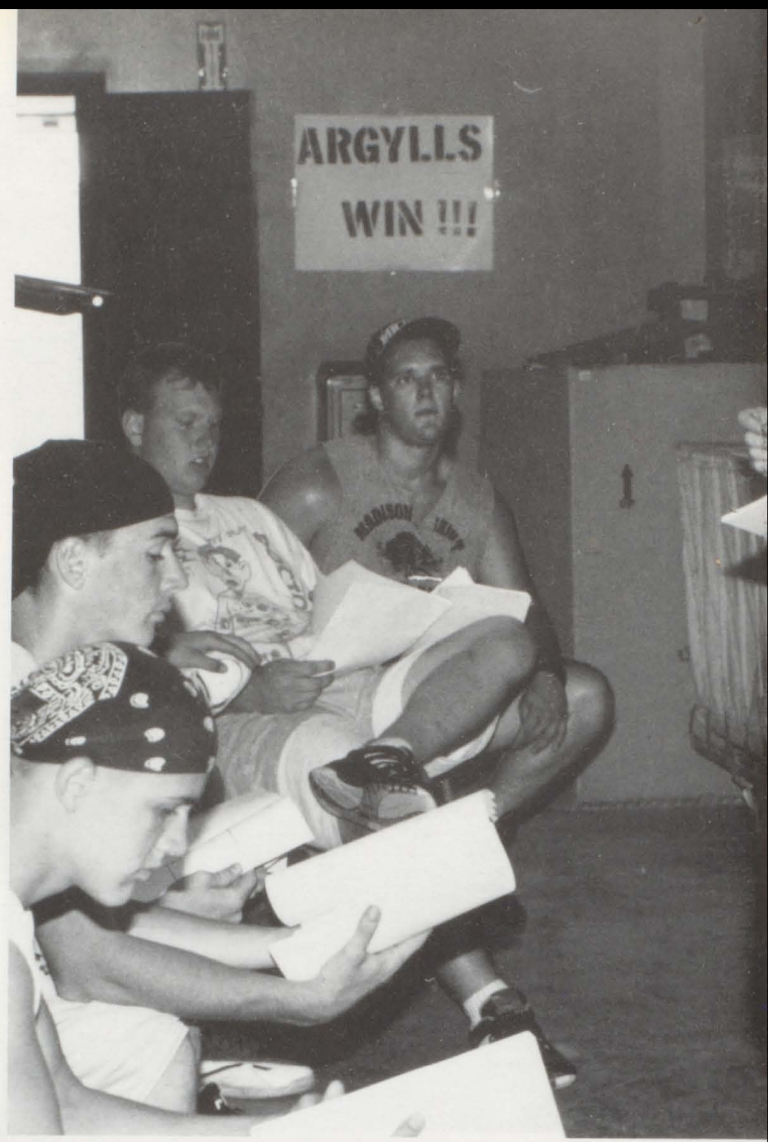

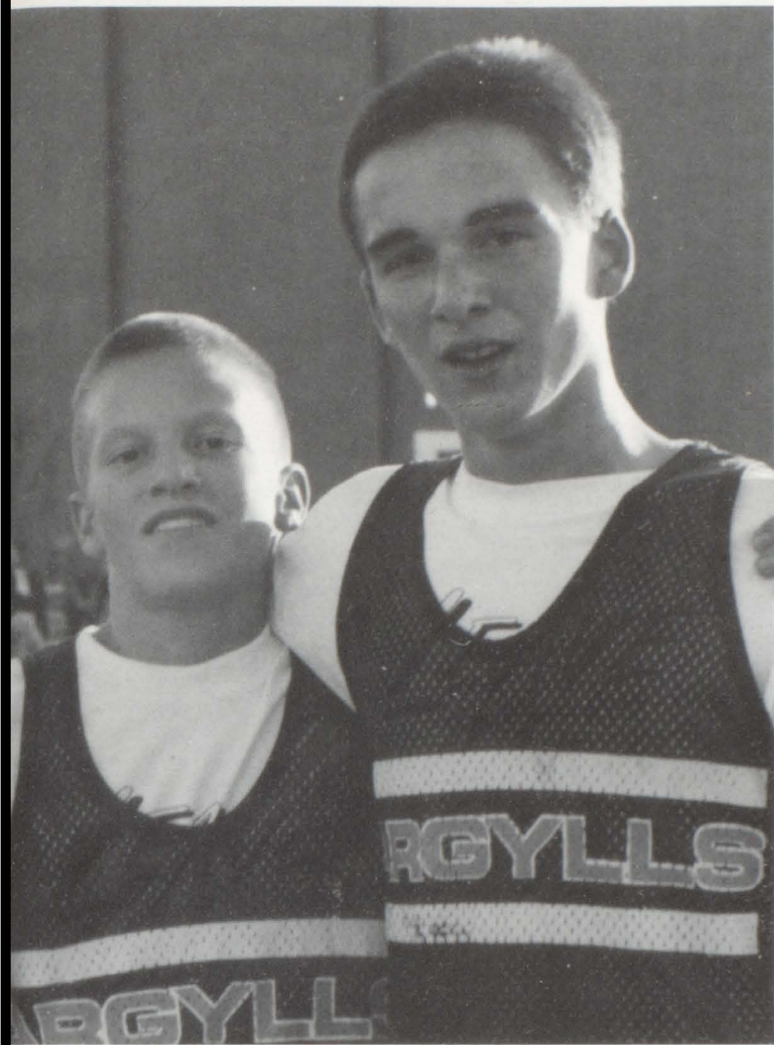

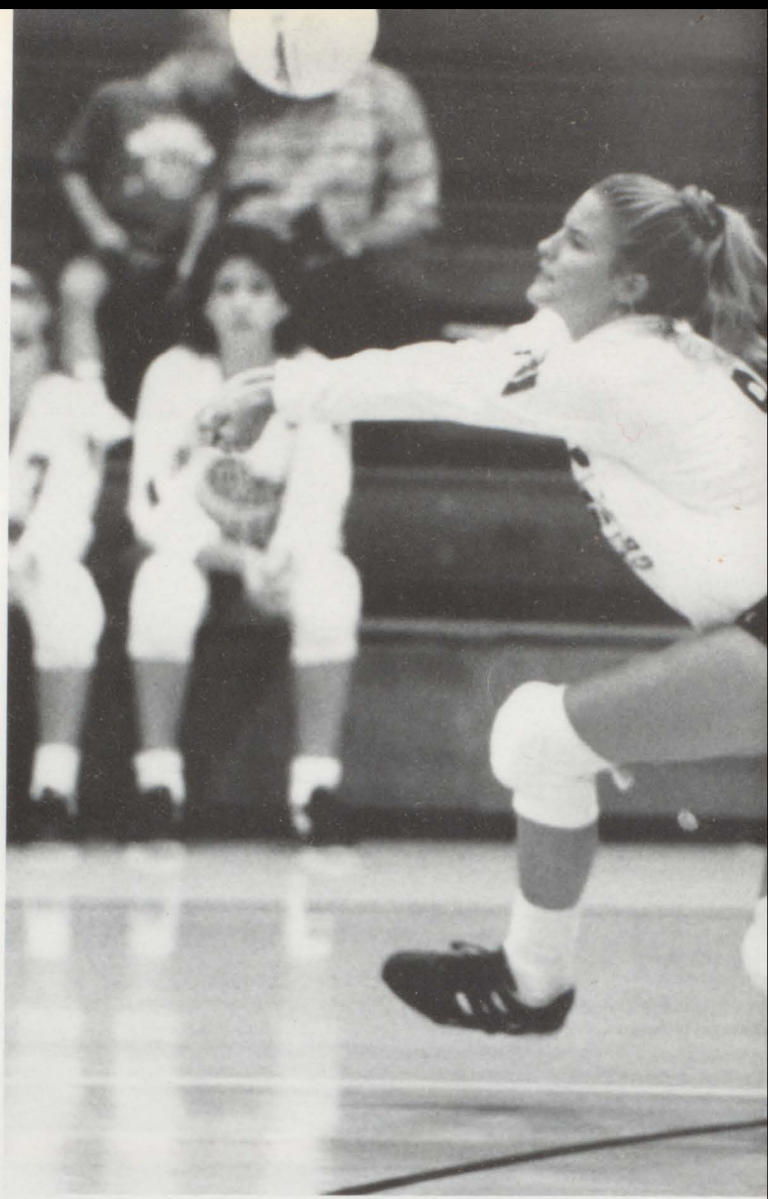

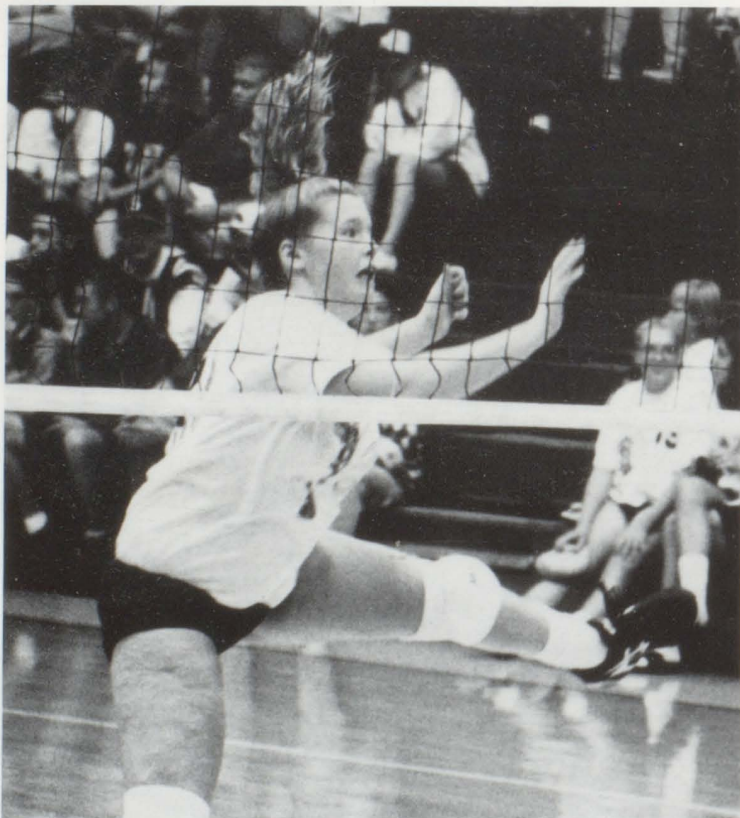

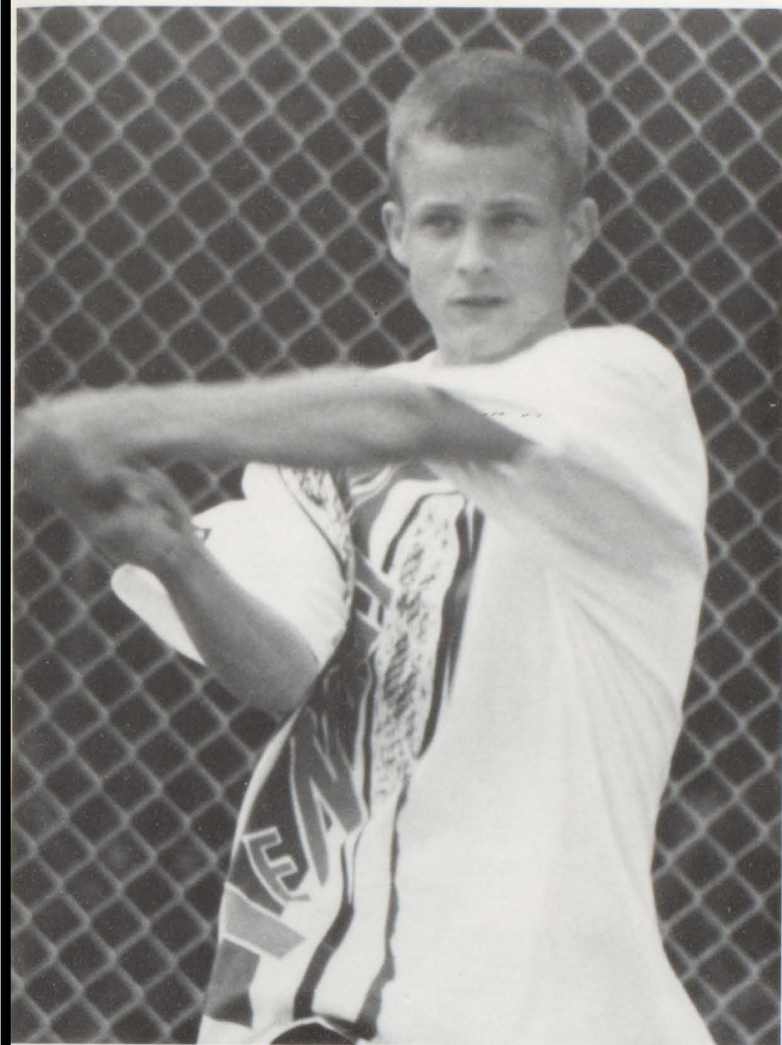

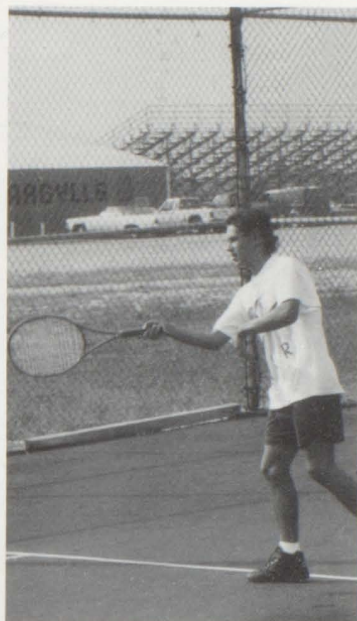

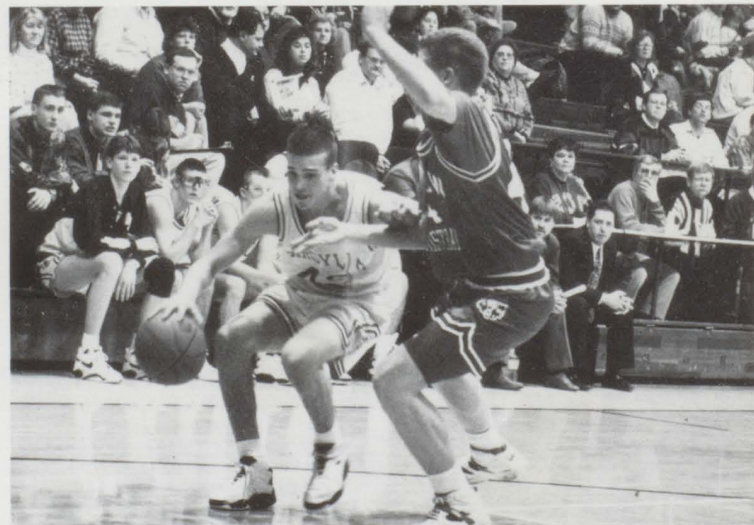

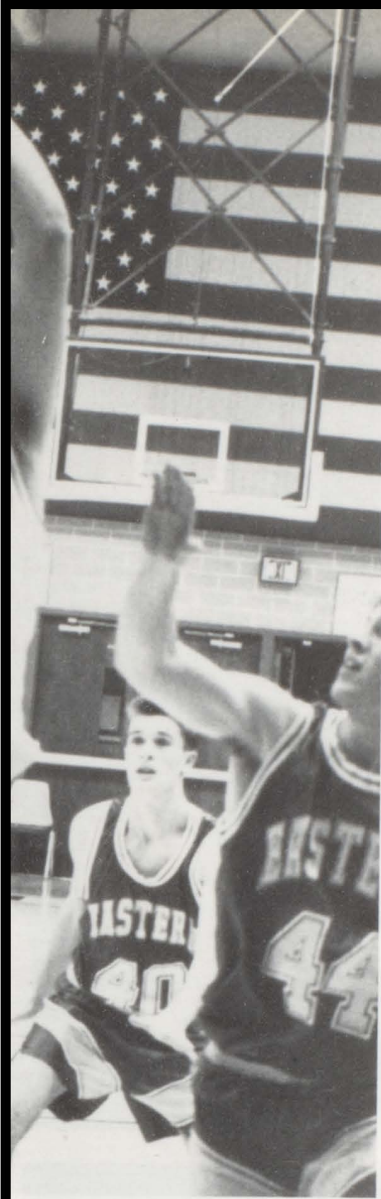
Slaying The Dragon

This year, the young female athletes had

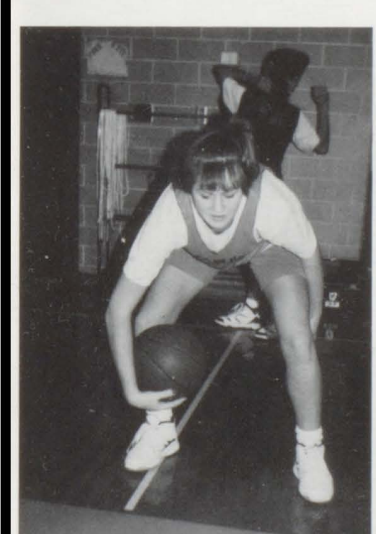

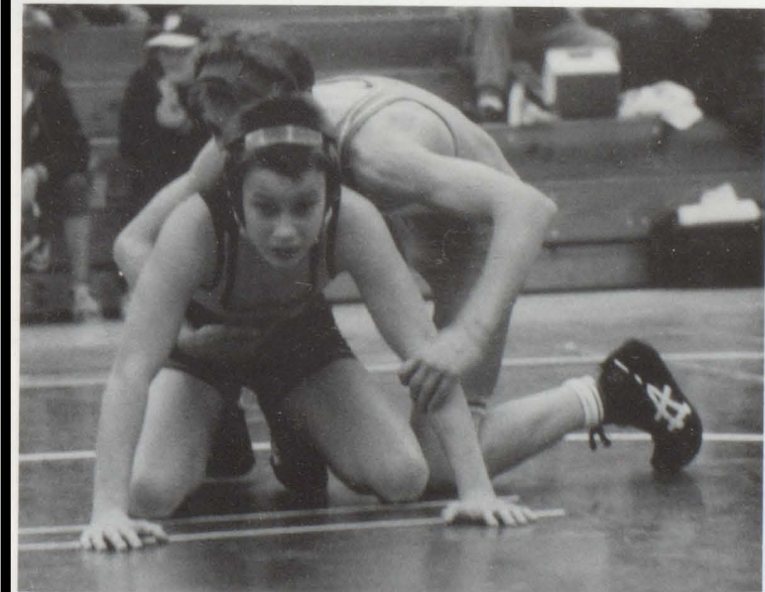

Jewels in the Dust

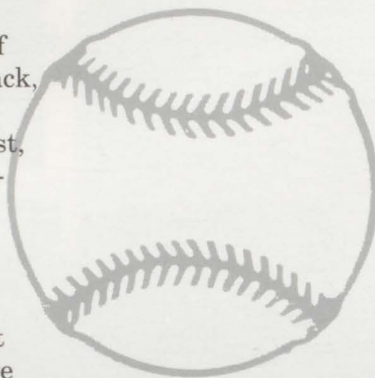

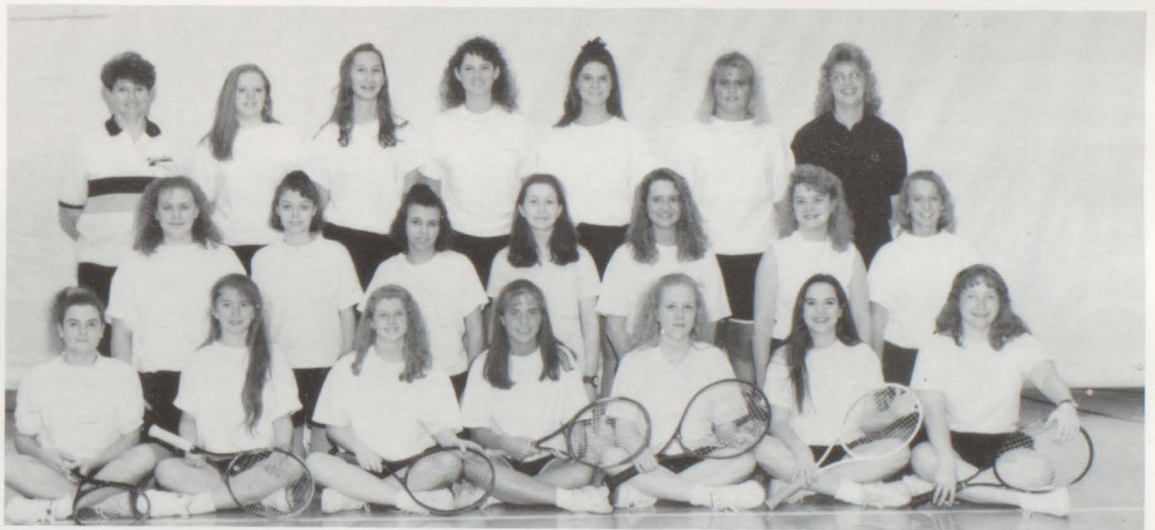

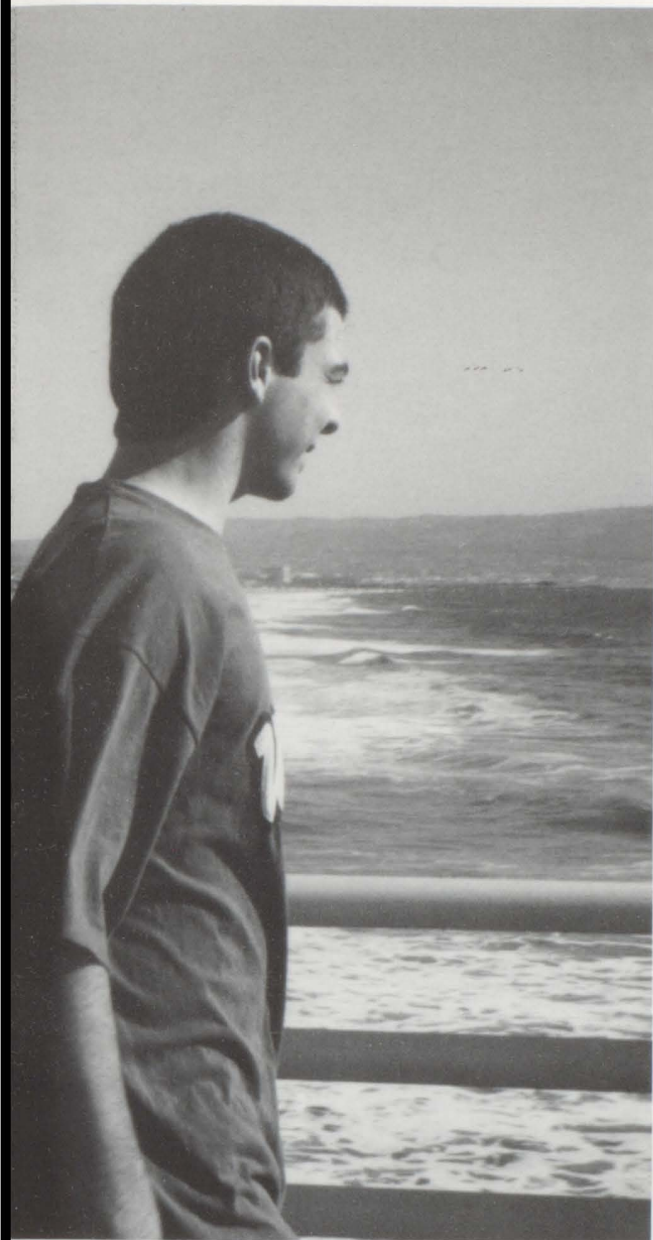

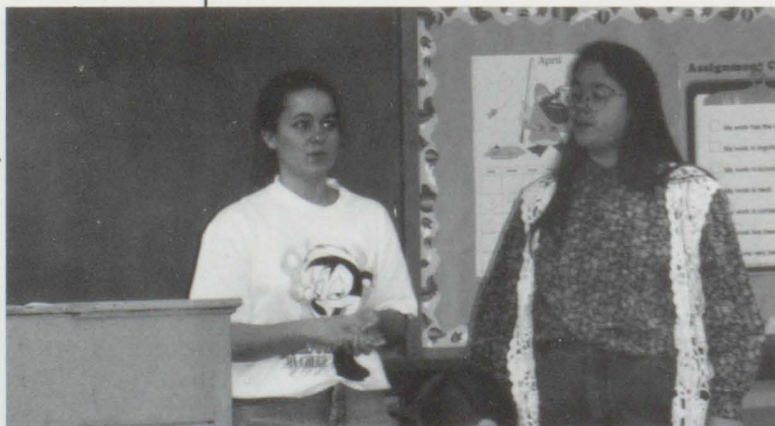
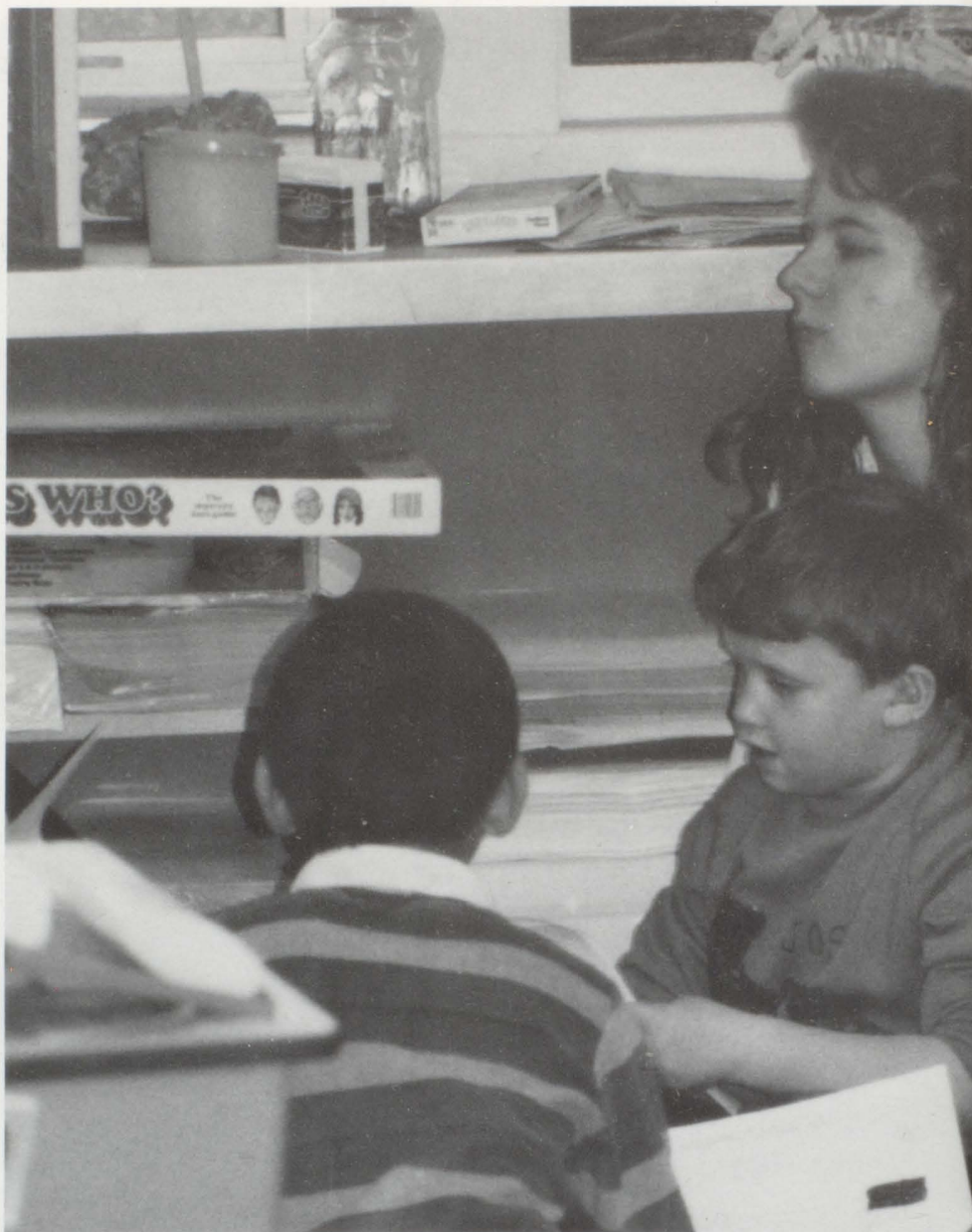


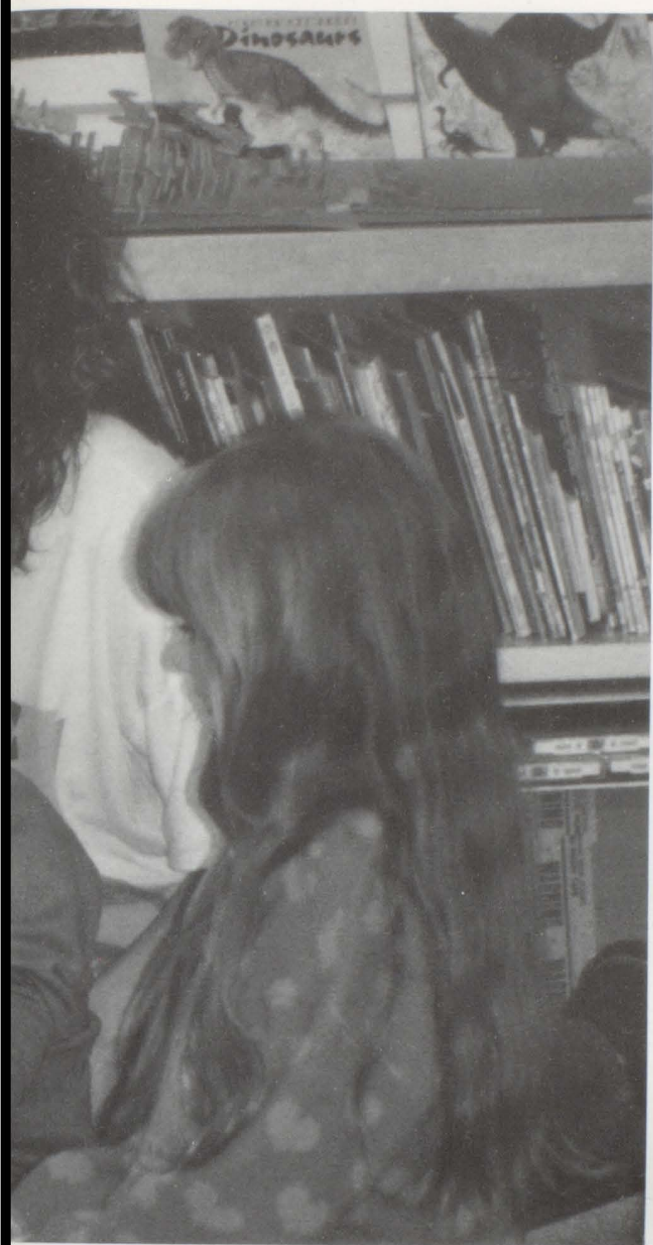
THE QUEEN'S QUESTS

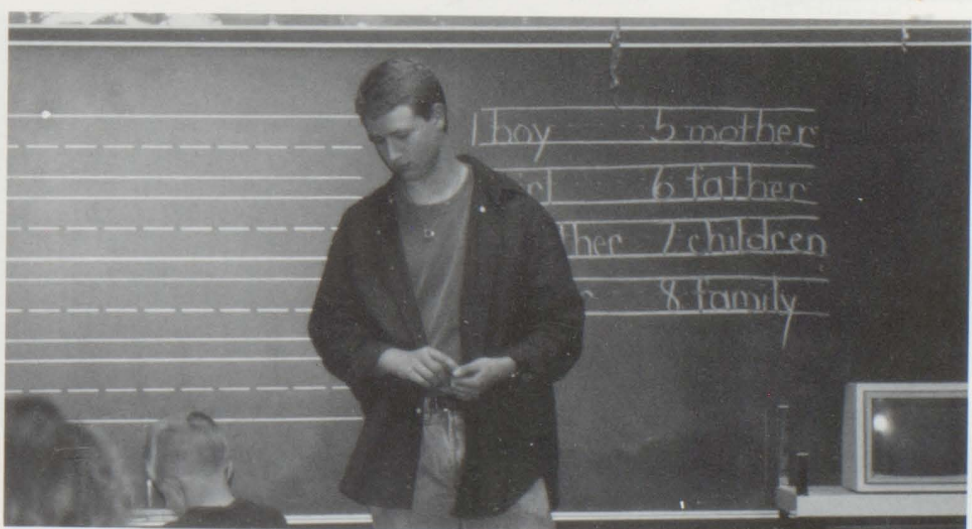

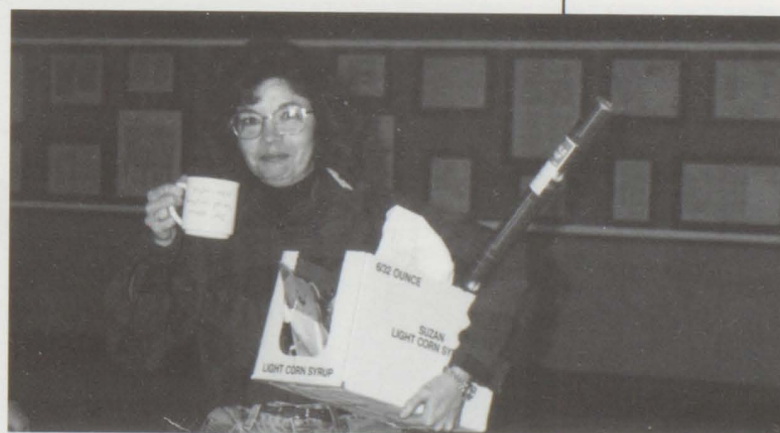
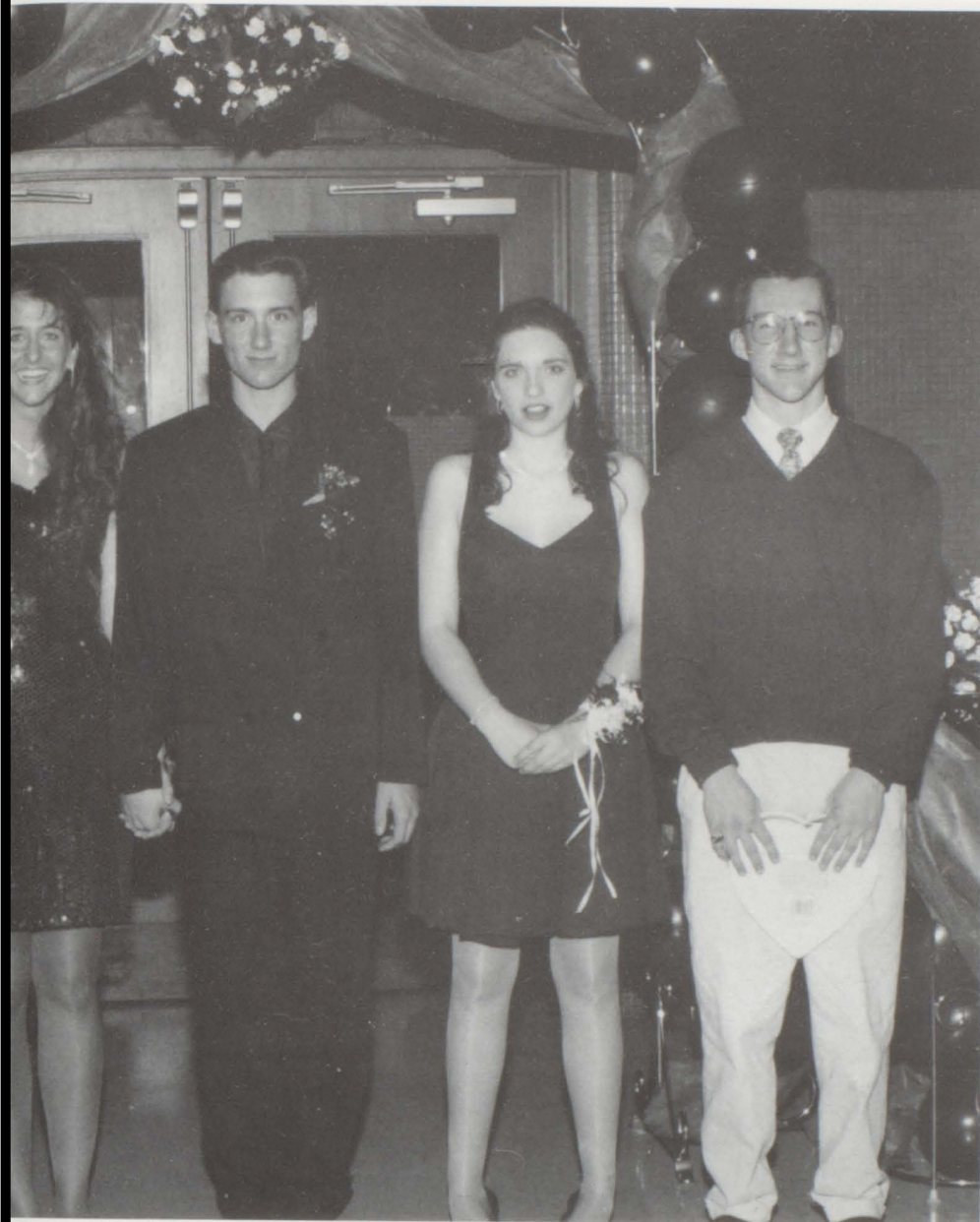

DANCING DUKES AND DUCHESSSES

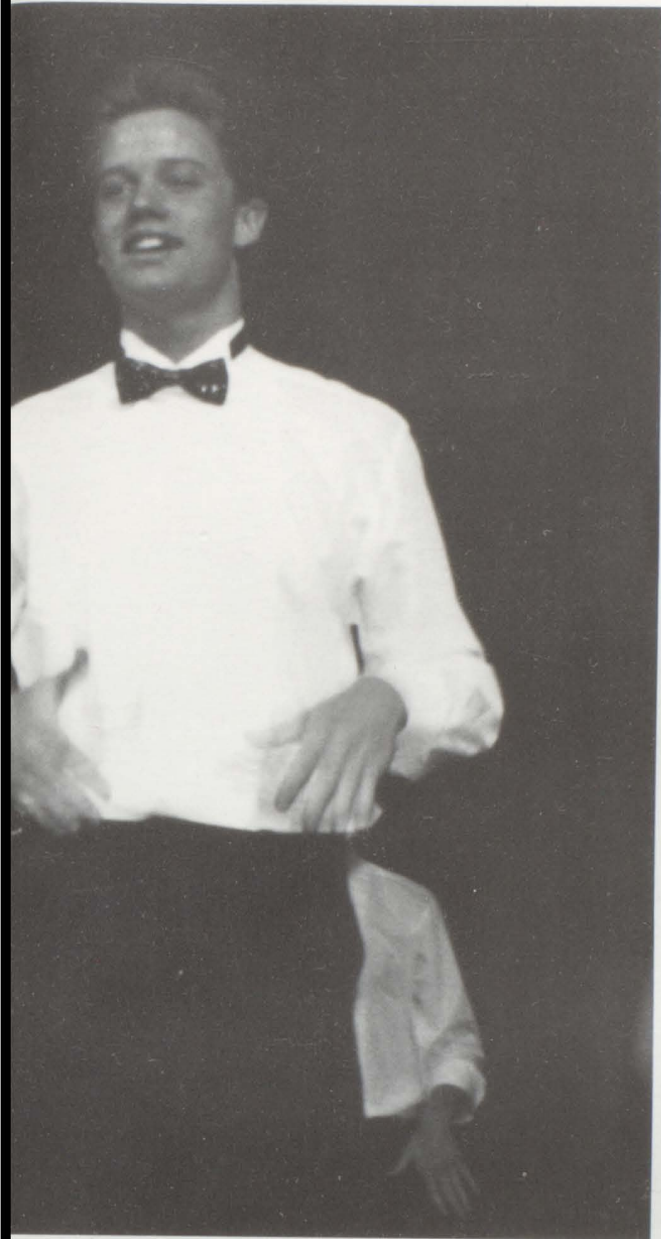

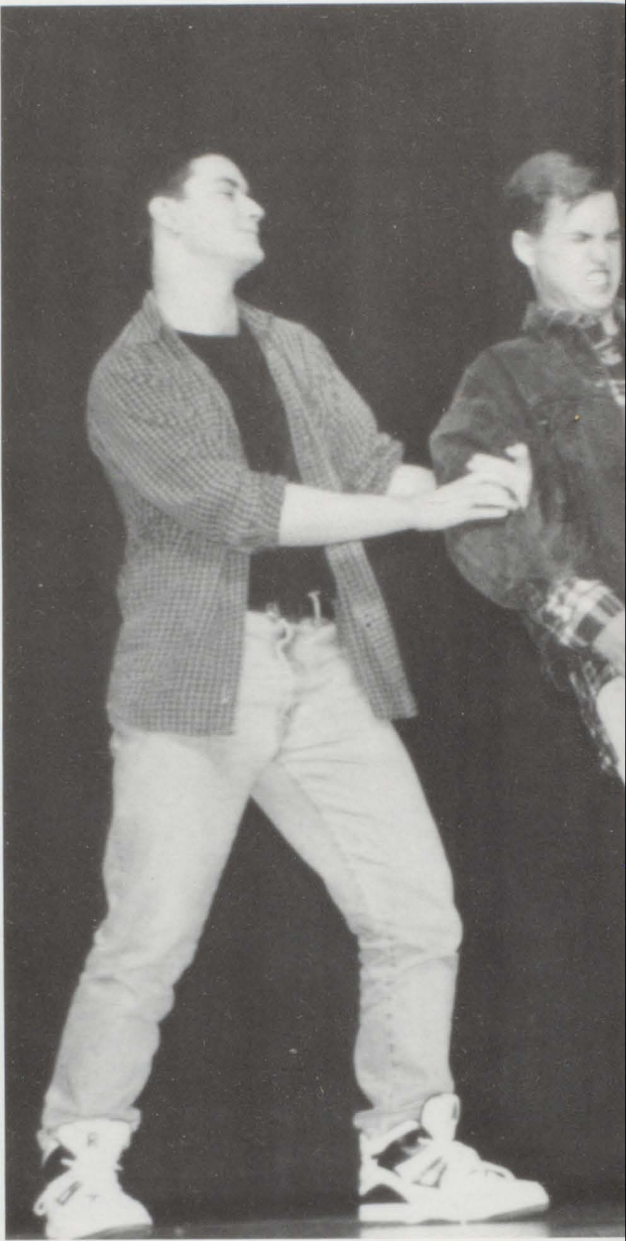

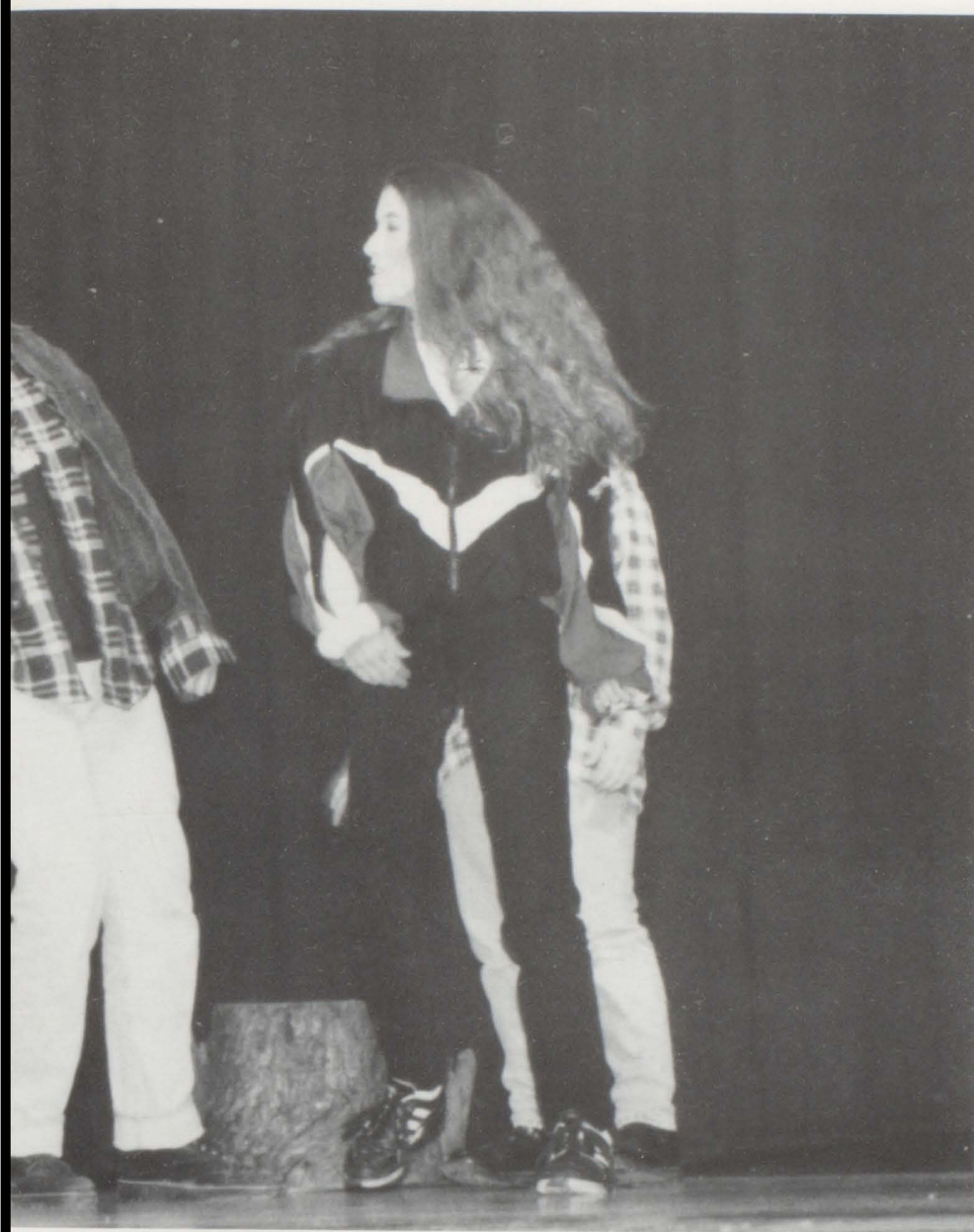
ROYAL EVENTS

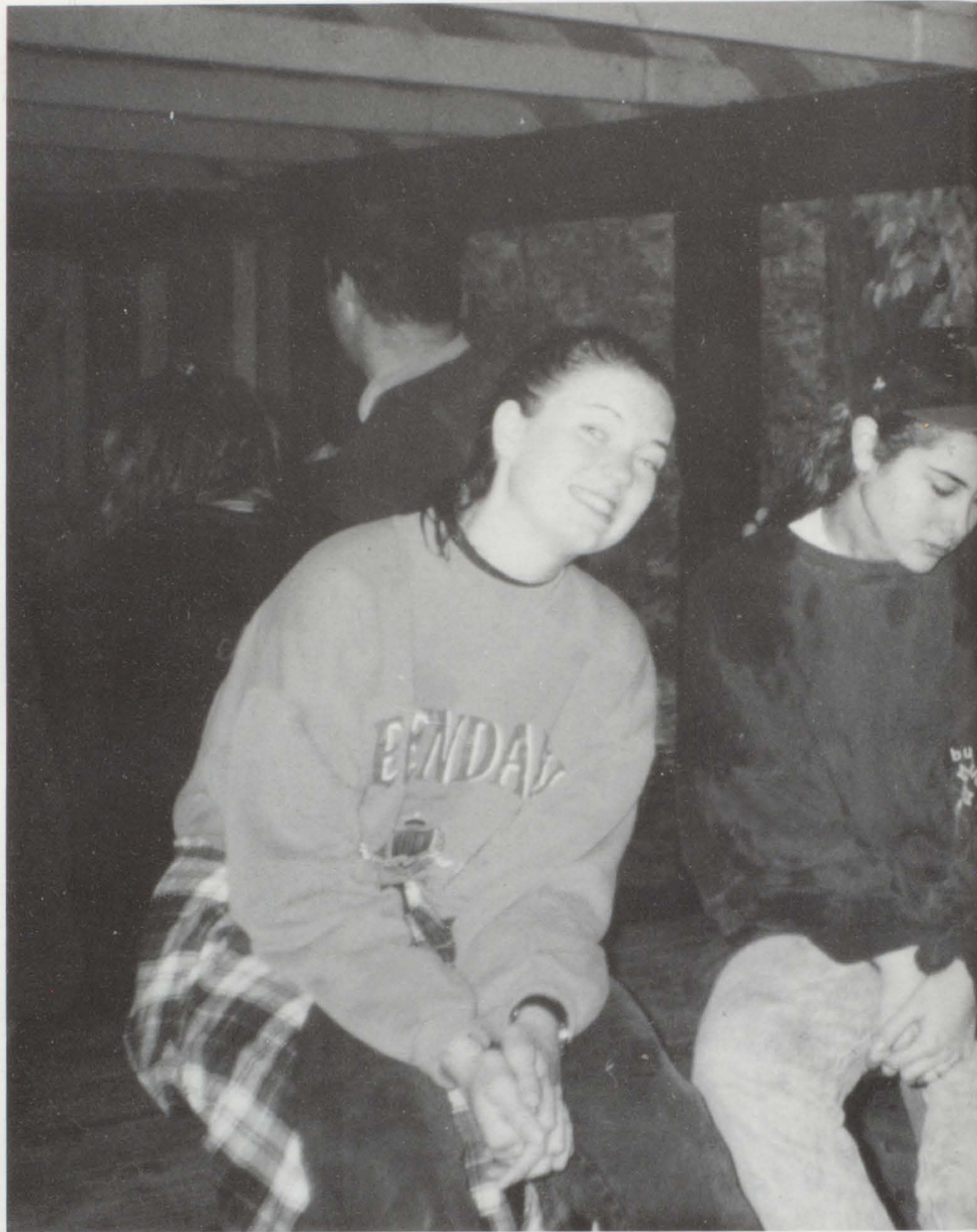


LONG-LIVE CHIVALRY!

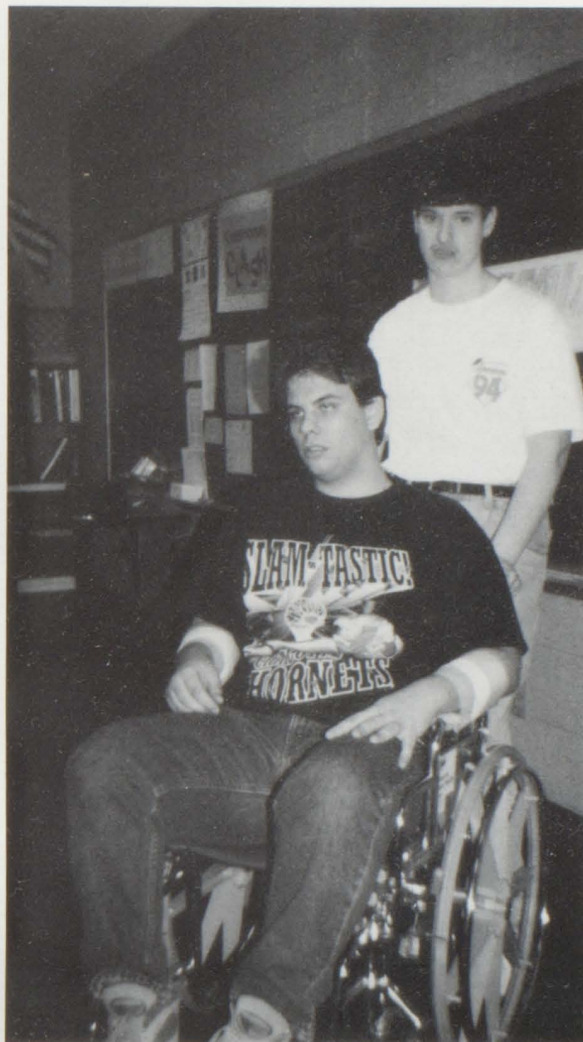

A DRUG TEST FOR PARENTS.



Wild mood swings, or a dramatic change in behavior, is often a sign of a drug problem.

Enlarged pupils may be caused by cocaine or crack.

A frequently runny or stuffy nose, or regular nosebleeds, may indicate use of cocaine.

A dramatic increase of appetite may signify marijuana use.

A dramatic decrease of appetite may signify use of cocaine or crack.

Poor concentration and memory may be signs of marijuana, cocaine or crack use.

Bloodshot eyes may be caused by marijuana.

Serious lack of sleep, or an unusual sleep pattern, may result from cocaine or crack.

No parent wants to believe his kid is using drugs. A good way to know if he is, is to know your kid. If he displays some of the symptoms above, talk to him. Ask him about the symptoms. He may not be on drugs. He may simply be ill, or going through a tough emotional stage.

But if the signs are strong and you need advice, call 1-800-662-HELP or contact a local drug abuse agency. People there are trained to spot drug problems, and can recommend a treatment program if it's needed.

So study this drug test. For the good of your child, it's one exam you must not fail.

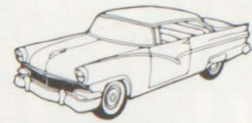

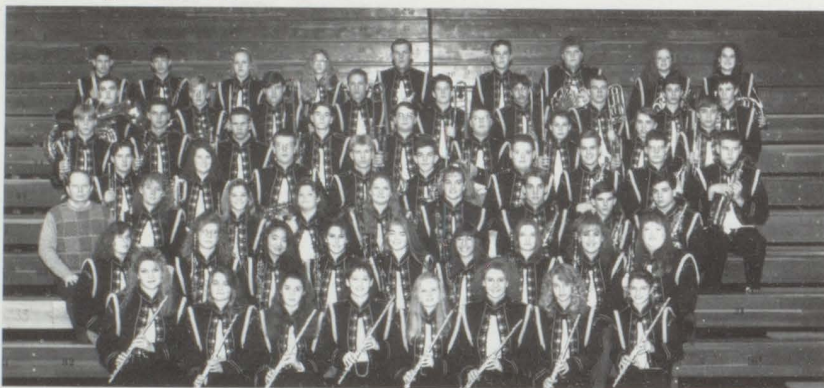

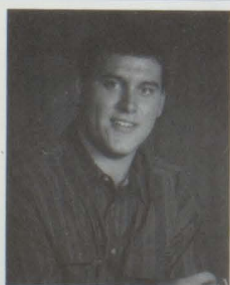
