
THE APPRENTICES


The competition was tough all week, especially between the two upper classes. Everyone was vying for the top spot, and yet all still remained proudly on the same side, the black and gold.

All's well that ends well, they say. The Argylls had beaten Blackford, and the juniors and seniors had ranked supreme.







As each year changes, the class curriculum broadens as well.






Although it seemed as though the Argyll band, as a whole, would be hurt with such a loss as David Amick, there always seemed to be at least one

Several churches, schools, and even a prison were on their agenda. One couple knew quite a bit of English, and Kerri tested out her vocabulary by answering them in Spanish. (Mrs. Melson would be proud). Modestly Kerri admitted that she did well in this situation, but when it came to people on the street she could only catch bits and pieces, as most spoke too quickly for her to understand everything.

Some of her most solemn memories of the trip are also the ones that most likely helped her to "smell the coffee." Although she did not have to go out of the United States to see sights such as the homeless sleeping in cubby holes and cardboard boxes and an old man eating out of a trash can, these images still touched Kerri's heart and helped her to be even more thankful for what she has.







Overall Susanne had a great time in the U.S. Even though she preferred German food, she liked her life over here.




Taking time out for fun the group traveled to Flagstaff, Arizona, where the Grand Canyon became the focus of their attention.




No Pain, No Gain




A Call to Arms







tennis shirt), didn't produce a winning season, but the players did learn something about themselves and about the game of tennis. The tennis team also learned how to lose gracefully.





The team was composed of many players who could someday become an important part of the varsity team. Todd Rudy and Shawn Waymire combined for a large part of the scoring for M-G.


The team ended the season 12-2, with losses only to Kokomo and Marion.



Ketchem sang in Nashville. Also, Jeremy Justus came back with dread locks! Students returned refreshed and renewed, ready to finish the school year.



One of these moments was when they shared the stage with Sandi Patti. They reigned supremely at Choral Festival, and all were to be applauded.




LONG LIVE CHIVALRY!
